FOOD & GARBAGE

- Food left outside or in open buildings
- Soda, sweetened beverages

• Beer, wine, cider, grain-based beverages


- Food preparation odors
- Unsecured garbage
- Garbage with an odor
- Empty recycling cans
- Cans or jars of food
- · Freezer with or WITHOUT food
- Coolers with or WITHOUT food
- BBQ grills
- Food smokers
- Burn barrel with unburned materials
- Fire rings with unburned materials
- Harvested game meat



Be aware that empty garbage cans, freezers, refrigerators, and coolers can attract bears due to residual food odors.

GARDEN

- Compost with meat, fruit, or vegetable scraps
- Ripe fruit on trees or ground
- Other fruits and vegetables outside
- Bee hives
- Nuts on trees or ground
- Fertilizer



Compost piles of just grass & leaves are OK

PET & LIVESTOCK FEED

- Dog, cat, rabbit, or other pet food
- Grain and chicken feed

- Bird feeders, seed, and suet

Bird feeders should **come down March 15th.** OK to put back up
December 1st

- Hummingbird feeders
- Fish food for fish in outdoor ponds
- Molasses and animal supplement blocks
- Game blocks
- Blood, raw meat, or gutsUntanned animal hides

It is illegal in MT to feed ungulates (deer, elk, moose, antelope)

Auto & shop attractants are not

eaten by bears, but they have

been known to attract bears if

SECURE YOUR TRASH WITH A BEAR-RESISTANT GARBAGE CONTAINER

Containers come with several tips and tricks that make them more effective at dissuading bears from trying to snack on your garbage. Securing your garbage and other attractants are major components of reducing human-bear conflicts.

BEARS HAVE AN EXCELLENT SENSE OF SMELL...

- Use plastic bags with ties to contain all garbage; no loose garbage in the container! Make it easier to unload your bagged garbage, if you are the hauler or if you have a hauler
- Get rid of smelly garbage, weekly when possible, since odors can draw in curious bears
- Freeze smelly garbage and discard it in the container on pickup day.
- Put your garbage container out the morning of pickup, when possible.
- Load garbage in your vehicle just before going to a refuse transfer site.
 Bears may climb into pickup truck beds.
- Keep all garbage and other attractants in secured garages or sheds where possible. Bear- resistant garbage containers are the last line of defense. Bears can roll and try to open these containers.

KEEP YOUR GARBAGE CONTAINER CLEAN AND WORKING PROPERLY

- Avoid the potentially nasty job of scrubbing the container by bagging all garbage. Smelly garbage containers can become attractants to bears and entice curious bruins close to homes.
- Clean them with a very diluted bleach/ water solution to remove smells. Wipe away any waste residue. Be sure you dispose of any waste residue properly or it can attract bears.
- Prevent the latches from freezing, come cooler temperatures, by spraying WD-40 on the latch mechanism.
- No need for a "blow torch" in late
 November to open the lid. After
 the bears hibernate, you can avoid
 snapping the lid closed remember to
 close them tightly once spring arrives!
- Develop your own tricks for storing garbage and please pass the word along. The best ideas come from inventive community members.
